SLC Council District 6	5. Do you think that other topics related to the environmental impacts of the Utah Inland Port need to be addressed by Salt Lake City?
Dan Dugan	<p>I think the City is addressing topics we can affect change. I'd like to see us voice our concern with the direction the UIPA is taking with the other inland ports. As a long time supporter of the STPP coalition and participant in the meetings, I want to first thank you for your work. I am always impressed with the passion and energy of the coalition along with the depth of the knowledge. You should be proud of the difference you are making here in Salt Lake City and beyond. I feel I have a good understanding of the coalition's positions as I work to find solutions from the SLC council position. We have come a long way and work well together. Couple items on our plate: the environmental studies (health, traffic, community) of the Inland port area being worked between multiple parties; the NWQ master plan; Shoreline preserve; annexation of the Northpoint; and pesticides. They are all in some way linked to the vision of taking care of our residents, environment, and Great Salt Lake. My goal is to reduce as much as possible the environmental impacts and health impacts to our residents. The areas, unless already zoned for development, should not be developed but left in their current zone or transitioned into a natural state (shoreline preserve or land swap). My intent is to continue working with the City Admin, the other council members, and community groups in finding solutions that take care of our residents and Great Salt Lake.</p>
